The typical temperature in Copenhagen during March is around 4-8°C (39-46°F).



The Danish currency is DKK (kroner and øre). The usual exchange rates are around:

EUR 100 = DKK 745
USD 100 = DKK 755
GBP 100 = DKK 850



The most common credit cards used in Copenhagen are Visa and Mastercard. However, most major credit cards are also accepted in ATMs/cash machines and at hotels, shops, cafés and restaurants. Some places may charge a fee when accepting foreign credit cards as payment.



Service charges are included in hotel, restaurant, and taxi bills. However, do feel free to tip if you find that you have received great service. It is entirely up to you how much to tip, and there is no set etiquette for this in Denmark.

Explore Copenhagen

With all the Pre-Moot excitement, you will no doubt deserve to take some time off to enjoy Copenhagen.

Lonely Planet has chosen Copenhagen as the #1 city in the world to visit in 2019 and, in 2022, the lifestyle and global affairs magazine Monocle ranked Copenhagen as the “world’s most liveable city”. Copenhagen truly is a great place. It is relatively small with excellent public transport, so you can cover most of the city in a weekend. Copenhagen is divided up into unique areas and is easy to navigate. Visit the different areas and experience the diversity of Copenhagen.

City Centre

Nyhavn, the Royal Palace of Amalienborg, Rosenborg and The Little Mermaid are just some of Copenhagen’s popular sights and are all located in or around the historical city centre. Explore the back streets, courtyards and alleyways of inner Copenhagen and find a variety of shops, cafés, restaurants and historic buildings. Experience Strøget; the longest pedestrianized shopping street in Europe or walk along the canals to the cobbled streets of Christianshavn or the famous “freetown” Christiania.

Vesterbro

Vesterbro is the up-and-coming area of Copenhagen. Vesterbro has its own Meatpacking District, where you will find laid-back bars, clubs, and fine dining side-by-side. Feel the Vesterbro-vibe at Istedgade and Vesterbrogade - both packed with great restaurants and bars, or visit Værnedamsvej; a quiet side street of delis, cafés and restaurants.

Nørrebro

At Nørrebro - a short walk past The Lakes from Nørreport station - you will find some of the coolest streets in Copenhagen. The cosy street Jægersborggade offers Michelin-starred restaurants, funky cafés, vintage shops and wine bars side-by-side, and Elmegade is a nightlife and gastronomic hotspot. Take a break from the noisy city at Assistens Cemetery, where you can visit Hans Christian Andersen’s grave, or just enjoy the tranquility.

Østerbro

Østerbro is located between The Lakes and the sea and is a favorite of young Copenhagen families. Copenhagen’s largest park, Fælledparken, and the national stadium, Parken, are both located at Østerbro - but the area still manages to ooze a cosy, neighbourhood feel. Find some of Copenhagen’s best Danish design shopping streets, Østerbrogade and Nordre Frihavsgade, both full of small boutiques, or take a break at one of Østerbro’s popular cafés. Plesner is also located at Østerbro, near the sea.

Frederiksberg

From Copenhagen Central Station, you will find Frederiksberg by walking along Gammel Kongevej; a fantastic shopping street with grand old buildings, fashionable cafés and restaurants. At the other end, you will find another breathing space in the city - Frederiksberg Have; a beautiful royal park, from where you can see the elephants in the Zoo (for free).

If the weather is good, the best way to see Copenhagen is to follow the locals and hop on a bicycle. The city bikes in Copenhagen are a quick and free alternative to cars, buses and taxis, when getting around the city. Virtually, all of Copenhagen can be toured by bicycle, except for pedestrian-only streets, and most streets have cycle lanes.



All taxis are licensed by the authorities and are equipped with meters. Taxis can be flagged down anywhere in the city and there are ranks at various points around the city centre. If the yellow “Taxa” light on the roof of the car or in the front window is on, the taxi is available for hire. By law, Uber is not allowed to operate in Denmark and has ceased operations.



You can take the Metro or the S-train and get almost anywhere in Copenhagen.
